Thanks for being a part of our Conference family for this week. Have a great time, and let us know if you need anything. Welcome to Valdez!



#### **Theatre Conference and Play Lab Orientation Session:**

An overview of the Play Lab process, covering everything from its overarching philosophy to the nitty-gritty details of where you go to rehearse.

#### From Impulse to Expression: An Exploration of Gesture, Sound, and Language with Carol Laursen

Often our juicy first impulses are abandoned as we move to something we think is safer. Using theater games and other structures we will investigate our artistic instincts: What happens when we open more fully to the gifts and surprises that rise from within? What will happen as we enter more deeply and reveal more completely our initial physical, vocal and verbal promptings? Appropriate for both writers and actors.

#### Bridging the Gap between the Playwright and the Actor with Michelle Gardner

Ever wondered what an actor sees the first time they read your script? Ever wanted to understand the actor's process better? This playwriting workshop aims to bridge the gap between the writer and the actor. It will cover how an actor reviews your script, what clues and descriptors they look for when building a character, what helps them vs. what hinders them, and how to communicate in a language they will understand.

#### Monologue Workshop with Laura Gardner and Frank Collison

How to research, rehearse, and make a monologue come to life for both you and for the writer. The Workshop gives actors the tools and hands on experience to fully inhabit, create, and bring themselves to the work. Actors come with memorized pieces and preliminary work done using the preparation sheet provided prior to the Conference. Work takes place over two classes and by individual appointment, and features memorized monologues written by participating playwrights.

#### How to Write When You Don't Want To with John Cariani

If you don't like to write, this workshop is for you. If you are lazy, this workshop is for you. If writer's block is a normal state for you, this workshop is for you. If you feel stuck when you write, this workshop is for you. If you feel like inspiration has vacated the premises more often than it visits, this workshop is for you. In this 90-minute session, we will do a series of exercises that will get you motivated, un-blocked, un-stuck, and inspired--exercises that will free you from your mind and help you connect to the "play" part of the word "playwright."

#### Two Wolves with Cassandra Medley

This free-writing monologue workshop incorporates guided exercises designed to help playwrights explore the multiple "wolves" that live inside of all great and imaginatively conceived characters. We will write several spontaneous monologues wherein characters express inner and external conflicts, agendas, strategies, and urgent needs. We will then work with techniques that help incorporate our new-found discoveries into the story turning points, climaxes, revelations, and urgent character motivations that comprise the plots of our plays.

#### Improv for the Actor with Warren Weinstein, Part One



**RKP (Reichman, Kellys, Pond) Production**'s mission is to bring meaningful drama forward by staging productions that don't necessarily fit into a typical theatre season. We wish to provide theatre which, we hope, will fill a space among the impressive theatre programs that already exist. The idea of RKP Productions began in 2011 when Bob Pond and Dick Reichman staged *The Glass Menagerie* at Out North Contemporary Art House. Bruce and Audrey Kelly joined the team in 2014 for a November production of a complex drama between a mother and daughter dealing with perceptions, choices and the right to make the choices, Marsha Norman's *'night Mother*. In 2015, RKP produced Deborah Brevoort's *The Women of Lockerbee*, which tells the poignant story of people coming together in the face of grief to mourn and find healing. Our 2016 offerings included Shakespeare's *The Winter's Tale* in February and two one acts in September: Dick Reichman's *The Phone*, about the difficulties involved in dealing with a parent with Alzheimer's disease, and Nava Semel's *The Child Behind the Eyes*, which highlights the struggles of a family coping with their son who suffers from Down's

Syndrome. In January 2017 RKP Productions and Cyranos Theatre Company co-produced a reprise of Dick Reichman's play about a financial planner, *How to Make Money by Dying*. This was followed in April with Timothy Daly's The Afterlife of J Edgar Hoover, a timely piece considering present day politics. RKP Productions is especially honored to bring The Afterlife of J. Edgar Hoover to The Last Frontier Theatre Conference this year.

**TBA Theatre's** mission is to enrich our community by providing innovative and comprehensive theatre arts experiences through which artists of all ages can develop their creativity and selfexpression; and in so doing stimulate human potential. In addition to staging numerous productions each year and collaborating with Three Wise Moose to produce the Don't Blink One-Page Play Marathon and Alaska Overnighters, every summer they produce summer theatre academies in Anchorage and around the state, providing fun and safe environment where young artists learn creative expression alongside professional actors, designers, and technicians. TBA has been presenting evenings of entertainment at the Conference for the past decade. Presented works have included Jacob Holder's Dirge for a Failed Bris, North to Alaska, Beyond The Veil, THE END, An Evening of Short Plays (Alaskan Plays from the Play Lab), Four From The 49th, Nothing In Common, I

Want to Believe, Absolution, Eoin Carney's The Rendering of Conor McShea, William Missouri Downs' Cockeyed and Rand Higbee's The Head That Wouldn't Die, which was remounted in Anchorage at Cyrano's Off-Center Playhouse. In the spring of 2007, they won national acclaim to be the first Alaskan theatre company to be invited to present plays at The Samuel French Off-Off Broadway Short Play Festival. The works selected for presentation were Arlita Jones' *Grand Central and 42nd* and P. Shane Mitchell's *The Resurrection of Humpty Dumpty*, both of which started as *Market* Resurrection of Humpty Dumpty, both of which started as Alaska Overnighters productions and have subsequently been presented here at the Last Frontier Theater Conference. TBA Theatre was named by readers of The Anchorage Daily News as Alaska's "Best Non-Profit" and "The Gold Standard in Family Fun" and has been named in the top three live theatres in the Anchorage Press for the past five years.

The Owl and Cat is a small 36 seat intimate black box theatre with a bar out back and an artist house up top. (Gabrielle, Thomas and co all live there and create work throughout the boho style building). They continue to push boundaries and are not afraid to try new things eg: film meets theatre, escape room theatre and more. Completely independent of any funding, they are entrepreneurs at heart. Recently adding an acting school and a speakeasy bar with the help of Aaron Savrone on the weekends to continue improving their quality of work. They are proud to keep the doors open to all actors by holding general auditions at the start of each season and are always on the hunt for new scripts from both emerging and established playwrights. 2017 has seen the launch of a new program - Platform - where The Owl and Cat are donating their time and resources to 4 groups of artists who are

working on a play in development. This year has also seen The Owl and Cat increasingly producing immersive experiences, from a play at dinner with actors and audience, to roaming shows and even an 8 seater bedroom turned theatre upstairs. They continue to push boundaries and tackle taboos in experimental ways. Perhaps next year they will bring you an immersive experience to a dorm room! Gabrielle and Thomas are incredibly grateful that their little theatre has been asked back as producing partners for the 2nd year. 
Actors, show your interest by putting your name on our "Persons of Interest" sheet in the lobby. Role assignments are usually given out in the Civic Center during the lunch hour.

#### **Fringe History**

In 1998, Play Lab founder Michael Warren Powell wanted to hear a play that hadn't gotten into the Lab. The gathering of people that night in the student commons at the college was the seed from which the Fringe grew. Erick Hayden and Barry Levine took over coordination of the event in 2001, resulting in more regular scheduling and more support from the conference. From 2012 to 2014, Bostin Christopher and Janna Shaw coordinated the event. In 2015, Janna was joined by Rob Lecrone and the partnership of Shaw and Lecrone has been bringing you the Fringe ever since.



Over the years, the Fringe has performed in many spaces, including the Totem Inn, Ernesto's Taqueria, the Glacier Sound Inn, the Fat Mermaid, and the Best Western, its current home. Regardless of location, there is rarely an empty seat at this popular event.



#### Fringe Team

Your Fringe team of Shaw and Lecrone are back, with Janna Shaw in charge of casting and script selection and rabble-rouser Rob Lecrone performing hosting duties and providing additional support.



The Coordinator – Janna Shaw is back coordinating the Fringe and is determined to make this the best year yet. Janna's goals are to showcase works and performances unconstrained by the status quo. She does her best to carry on the established legacy with her own style of platform for artists of all origins and disciplines. All scripts submitted are thoughtfully read and all actors carefully selected. With inclusiveness in mind, it is with a heavy heart that every year some get left out. Have no fear hopeful fringe participants – you have a caring and approachable coordinator here who will fight for your right to fringe! Thanks to all who challenge Janna's organizational skills and who bless her by sharing windows to souls. There is never an unappreciated talent in the room.



**The Host** - Rob Lecrone returns for his third year hosting and co-producing the Last Frontier Fringe. Rob has had the pleasure of playing a number of Fringe-worthy roles this last year in Serial Killers at Sacred Fools in LA, including a pothead, an antebellum misogynist, a modern-day misogynist, an otherworldly gangster, an Englishman who constantly gets beaten up by Frankenstein, a cowboy who takes two minutes to die, and an awkward teenager with a camera. He can't wait to see the craziness that all of you get up to this week in the Fringe. Besides hosting the Fringe, Rob is also one of the coaches of the Monologue Workshop.



Jerry Harper is a hero of theatre in Alaska, renowned for his talent, kindness, and work ethic. More than one thousand people attended his memorial at the Wendy Williamson Auditorium in Anchorage. At the Conference, he was a fixture in the evening performances and the Play Lab. At the University of Alaska Anchorage, the Studio Theatre was renamed in his honor. The annual Jerry Harper Service Award has been created to honor people who have supported the Last Frontier Theatre Conference the way he did, heart and soul.

The Last Frontier Theatre Conference is the creation of many people. While credit is rightly given to its founders, PWSCC President Emeritus Jo Ann C. McDowell and Edward Albee, and to its staff, there are hundreds of people each year who play a role in its creation. From

the producers of the evening shows to the caterers, from the playwrights to the actors, from the financial benefactors to the people at the high school who loan us the music stands... it belongs to all of us.

The Jerry Harper Service Award exists to annually recognize someone who has gone above and beyond the call of duty over the life of the event. The first year's award was given to Michael Warren Powell, the father of the Play Lab. The next year it was given to the only Technical Director in the history of the Conference, Jim Cucurull. In 2009, it went to long-time Valdez Star reporter and participant Ron Holmstrom. In 2010, TBA Theatre Artistic Director Shane Mitchell was the recipient, and in 2011, powerhouse director and Conference supporter Erma Duricko was honored. We celebrated our 20<sup>th</sup> year by honoring the event's founder, PWSCC President Emeritus Jo Ann C. McDowell, and the year after we recognized her long time producing partner Gail Renardson. In 2014, Stan and Mary Helen Stephens were recognized for their long-time support of the Conference, as well as their generosity to PWSCC and the surrounding communities. The 2015 Jerry Harper Service Award was presented to longtime Anchorage Theatre mainstays David Edgecombe and Elizabeth Ware.

#### More than an actor: A Kind, Gentle Man

"The death of Jerry Harper removed from the local scene a man of enormous talent, one who very well might have been the greatest stage actor ever to perform in Alaska. He played everything with great artistry and skill. Comedy or drama, he was at the top of his game always—a man of perfect timing, an actor who could command the stage and embrace an audience, living the role that was his in every performance in which he starred. His credits as a director were as long as those of his performing roles, and he brought to the stage some truly memorable evenings of theatrical magic to Anchorage. More than all of that, he will be remembered for his kindness and gentle spirit. He was a true gentleman of the old school."

The 2017 Jerry Harper Service Award is being given to Sandy Harper. She is the Producing Artistic Director Emeritus of Anchorage's Cyrano's Theatre Company (CTC). CTC was co-founded by Sandy her husband Jerry, for whom this award is named, in 1992, the same year as the Last Frontier Theatre Conference.

Sandy and Jerry's formative years were spent in Southern California under the mentorship of Obie-award winner Rachel Rosenthal, and both were core members of Rosenthal's innovative theatre form, "Instant Theatre" and "Instant Fairy Tales," which were highly influenced and inspired by Antonin Artaud, John Cage, and Merce Cunningham. While in California, Sandy earned her Master's Degree in Human Development from Pacific Oaks College in Pasadena.

In Alaska, Sandy has served on the national board of the Last Frontier Theatre Conference, the board of the Anchorage Downtown Partnership, the board of the Rasmuson Foundation, and the board of the Anchorage Downtown Association. She also served as president of the Anchorage Cultural Council. Sandy's accolades include the Contribution to Literacy award as the initiator of the Alaska Center for the Book; the YWCA Notable Woman of the Year (2009); induction into the ATHENA Society (2009); recognition by the Soroptimist Society for her encouragement of women in the arts (2010); an Honorary Doctorate of Letters from UAA (2011); the Lorene Harrison Lifetime Achievement award (2011); and induction into the Alaska Women's Hall of Fame (2016).



Under Sandy's leadership, CTC has been noted for eclectic programming and major projects, such as five world-premiere plays about Alaska during the celebration of Statehood and *Anchorage*: *The First 100 Years*, a project which produced a play for every decade to celebrate Anchorage's centennial. Another big project was commissioning and producing *The Ticket*, written by CTC's Resident playwright Dick Reichman. She was featured in American Theatre Magazine for producing a series of plays honoring the indigenous peoples of Alaska. CTC has also been noted for spotting and producing plays read at the Last Frontier Theatre Conference, including Anne Hanley's *The Winter Bear*. Sandy was producer of many evening productions at the Conference, including Edward Albee's *A Delicate Balance*, *The Zoo Story*, *Seascape*, and *Albee's Men*, a collection of his work adapted and directed by Albee's protégée Glyn O'Malley. Sandy thanks the Last Frontier Theatre Conference for honoring Jerry with the establishment of the Jerry Harper Service Award and honoring her with this very special recognition on both CTC and the Last Frontier Theatre Conference's 25th Silver Anniversary.



#### ON GIVING FEEDBACK

- · Pose observations, don't offer solutions.
- A writer needs to know when you were engaged, and when you were not.
- A writer needs to know what you got out of a play.
- Your positive response is most helpful, while your negative response is not.
- This is a nurturing environment, though you do not need to coddle the writers.
- Do not offer rewrite suggestions. Do not rewrite the play. Do not make it what you think it should be.
- Whether you liked or disliked the play is irrelevant to your response.

The above guidelines were provided in the first year of the Play Lab by Lanford Wilson to Michael Warren Powell and the Lab panelists.

#### ON RECEIVING FEEDBACK

It is very important for each of you to know that you are the God of your own plays. These are the worlds you have created, and no person can tell you what your world must be.

When you receive the feedback on your play in the Play Lab and elsewhere, it is essential that you keep your ears open to everyone's comments. Be grateful that the person speaking has taken time to think about your work and state their opinion in front of a room full of people. It is a gift that they are giving you... be appreciative and gracious.

That said, they are responding immediately after seeing a reading that's had one rehearsal, at least here in Valdez. They know their immediate, gut response, which may not be perfect, but can be a great barometer.

Personally, when my work is being responded to critically, I write furiously on a note pad, smile, and nod. I non-verbally encourage people to keep telling me what they think. When it's all over, 60% of what I am given does not apply to the play that I am writing. I discard these responses, not damaged by them.

About 20% of what is given is also off-base, but the fact that they have had the reaction they did leads me to further understand how to clarify what I am trying to achieve.

And to the final 20% of the responses I say "wow, good idea, thanks!" I then write their idea into my play and act as if it was my good idea. How great a deal is that?

No one can rewrite your play, unless they have access to your computer files. Be strong in what you wrote. Be strong in what was your initial impulse to put this play on paper, to see it on stage, to have people sit and watch it. By being here, by being involved in this process, you have clearly said "I am a writer." Be one, and believe in yourself.

At the same time, take the time to humble yourself before the craft. There is an amazing amount of great thought about what goes into good story-telling. 
